We talk simply, openly and honestly about who we are, in developmentally appropriate ways.



We encourage community members to ask for what they need.



- Work as a unified team to strengthen and saturate developmental support with consistency and familiarity
- Teachers support children to ask for what they need
- Co-create appropriate goals with the intention of having carry over across domains of development, ensuring that the child has multiple opportunities to work on a variety of IEP goals
- Social and emotional development is at the basis of learning; emotional language and strategies are used throughout the learning day

Communication is key

- All children have an individualized timeline, and this should be honored, while being supported
- All supports and accommodations become intrinsic parts of the learning day
- All notes and documentation about an individual child are written with the understanding that the family will read them
- We encourage community building and nurturing in the
 Families are encouraged to give learning communities classroom, and outside of the classroom
 - whatever information they might have, and are willing to share
- All children have access and permission to explore all equipment and materials – some exceptions: personalized interventions/tools, when adult support is needed, when the child who's equipment it is says no
